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Greeting	Good afternoon judges, principal, teachers and fellow students.
Introduction	The motion of today is 'Cloning is immoral and should be banned'.  I am strong against the motion because it will be unwise to ignore the potential and enormous benefits that cloning may bring to human beings.
Body	Of all the scientific terms used nowadays, the most popular and controversial one seems to be 'cloning'. A clone means one or more offspring derived from a parental cell, whose genes are identical to that of its parent.
